Carolyn Nganga-Good, MS '07, BSN is a registered nurse and public health practitioner with more than 14 years of experience. She is a health programs bureau administrator with the Baltimore City Health Department, Bureau of HIV/STD services. She is responsible for managing HIV/STD testing programs in various settings. She is among the 25 public health nurses (the only one from Maryland) selected for the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Public Health Nurse Leader Program. Her project for this leadership program focuses on enumerating and characterizing the Maryland public health nursing workforce and highlighting how nurses are leading in building a culture of health to improve population health outcomes.



She is also pursuing a doctorate degree in public health. Her research interests include health policy, social determinants of health and health promotion, HIV-related health disparities, social justice, and health systems strengthening.

Marlene Cianci, PhD, MS'66, BSN'65, RN, earned a DIN from Abington Memorial Hospital School of Nursing, Abington, PA. She continued her nursing education in the RN-to-BSN program at University of Maryland School of Nursing (UMSON). In 1964, Dean Florence Gipe established the MS Program with a specialty in public health nursing, and encouraged her to apply. Cianci went on to became the first student to complete that degree in February 1966. She joined the UMSON faculty as an assistant to Dr. Martha Borlick, teaching in the graduate program, and later, served as RN advisor at the University of Maryland, College Park. Additionally, Cianci served as president of Pi Chapter, Sigma Theta Tau, from



1966-1968. After a nine-year hiatus to raise three children, Cianci was lured to George Mason University, by Dr. Evelyn Cohelan, former head of the UMSON graduate programs, and founder of the nursing program at GMU. Cianci remained at GMU for 21 years, teaching community health and senior seminar courses and serving as coordinator of clinical placements. While at GMU, Cianci earned a certificate in international nursing and a PhD in nursing history.

Since retiring in 1999, Cianci has pursued learning-in-retirement courses at the Johns Hopkins University, has became a certified Master Gardener through the University of Maryland Extension, and has continued volunteering in the community.

Alumni Leader Panel

Jeanette Jones, MS '70, RN, was born an identical twin in Suffolk, Virginia. As a Girl Scout for 16yrs, Jones developed a keen interest in nursing. A graduate of the first nursing class at East Carolina University in Greenville, North Carolina, Jones' first position after graduation was with the Virginia Department of Health in Virginia Beach, Virginia, where she practiced community health nursing for four years. She pursued graduate studies at UMSON to become a



nurse educator. While she was a student, Jones was employed by the Baltimore County Health Department as a nurse manager. After graduation she joined the faculty at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, Virginia. where she taught community health nursing for 25 years. Throughout her nursing career, Jones used the values of health promotion and disease prevention across the lifespan to guide her while practicing and teaching. In her own life, she sought health promotion through fitness, which included playing competitively in the United States Tennis Association League; she has participated in several national championship tournaments over the past 40 years.

Additionally, Jones assisted her parents with maximizing their independence and promoting quality of life during the last decade of their lives. Her parents moved to Richmond from Suffolk in 2000 to live together until brief illnesses resulted in both of their deaths. Jones is passionate about healthy nutrition and physical fitness. She volunteers with the Arthritis Foundation and the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation and serves on UMSON's Board of Visitors.



Laura Culbertson, MS '86, BSN '79, RN, took a course during her master's degree program at the University of Maryland that gave her a foundation in organizational and community theory. At the same time, she had the opportunity to work in home care on the weekends, and her caseload placed her on Baltimore's west side. This gave her insight into the role caregivers have in the health of the community. Early in her career, Culbertson

founded a community health center, a partnership between Union Memorial and the Govans Neighborhood Association. A community needs assessment indicated that health care access was an issue for the residents of this community; this was Culbertson's introduction to a core function of public health in assessing census tract data. Today, she works for the Baltimore County Department of Health, where she has worked for more than ten years. She manages the quality improvement division as it prepares for their Public Health Accreditation Board application process. Culbertson says her master's degree gave her a solid foundation in theory and research in community health nursing. Additionally, she has used her minor in education to work effectively with various levels of students throughout her career. She adds that a strong connection to educational partners is of vital importance to public health.
