





Rape through Art and Literature

- ▶ For centuries, the topic of rape thrived on silence, shame and prudery. Art and literature point this out to us.
- ▶ Not until the 1970s and second women's movement did the landscape begin to
- CR groups, rape crisis centers, emergency room and psychiatric nurses and women's' health centers picked up the drum beat to shatter the silence.
- Victims did not report, did not receive health care or counseling while predators committed their crimes with impunity.









Tess of the D'Urbervilles: A Pure Woman Thomas Hardy (1891)

- the classic 19th century rape novel-astragedy. The young Tess is seduced and abandoned by the artistocratic Alex early integrated to another working and living aftes has been studied; and living aftes has its thus "ruined"; late and living over with and marries a "virtuous" man larged Alonsol Clare so "virtuous" man
- After the marriage he confesses a previous infidelity and she forgives him, confident that she can then at last tell him her secret.
- But he is too shocked by the revelation and abandons her for a time, during which she meets the original rapist again, who is (sort of) repentant, but in a strangely melodramatic frenzy she kills him before Angel can return, and is executed for murder at the end of the novel.



Rape Circa 13th -19th century: the Legal Principle

- ▶ Laws greatly shape public opinion and attitudes
- ▶ 17th century legal theorists
- ▶ Chief Justice Matthew Hale: "an accusation easily made and hard to be proved"
- ▶ John Wigmore's concern of unchaste women
- "She must go at once and when the deed is newly done, with the hue and cry, to the neighboring townships and show the injury done to her to men of good repute, the blood and her clothing stained with blood and her torn garments."
- If the accused man protests his innocence, the raped virgin must then have her body examined by four law-abiding women sworn to tell the truth as to whether she was defiled or is still a virgin
- ► This is still called "making a fresh complaint".

Cases that haunt me: Kitty Genovese

- ▶ On March 13, 1964, a 28-year-old woman named Catherine "Kitty" Genovese was raped and killed in two separate late-night attacks near her home in Kew Gardens, Queens


 The story was barely reported until

Case solved

- ▶ Later that week, there was suspected robbery by Winston Moseley, who was arrested
- Moseley drove a white Corvair; Witnesses of Kitty's murder reported seeing a white car
- ▶ Police accused him; he confessed
- ► Hands had scratches and cuts
- ► Had spotted Kitty at traffic light and followed her home
- Had been driving around Queens looking for a victim
- Married with three children; No prior record

 He confessed to several other rapes and two more murders
- Provided information only the murderer would know
- ▶ Sentenced to death; Reduced to a life sentence
- ► Check the location of the crimes


Clinical Issues in the 1970

- ▶ Over 1 year
- ► Interviewed by Burgess & Holmstrom
- > 26 papers and 3 books
- ▶ Used Chicago style interviewing




Boston City Hospital Study: Classifying Sexual Trauma


- The study population consisted of all persons who entered the emergency ward of Boston City Hospital the one-year period with the complaint of having been raped.
- ▶ The sample was made up of **146** patients: 109 adults, 34 female children, and 3 male children.
- 5 male clinters.
 5 Classified 146 patients into three sexual trauma categories: I) victims of forcible rape (either completed or attempted rape, usually the former), 2) victims pressured into sex due to their inability to consent: and 3) victims of sexually stressful sexual encounters to which they had initially consented but that went beyond their expectations and control.
- Data from 92 adult women ages 18-73 comprised the group who were diagnosed with rape trauma syndrome and were in the study.












































Rape can make policy: Mary Vincent, 15


- on the 29th of September, 1978. 15-year-old Mary Vincent decided she was going to run away from home. Her parents were going through a divorce and she needed some time alone. Los Angeles was the destination
- Larry Singleton stopped to give her a ride in his van





Policy

- After raping and sodomizing Mary, Singleton severed both of her arms with a hatchet and threw her down a 30 foot culvert
- He believed that he had killed Mary and that nobody would ever know what he had just done. He was wrong.
- Mary Vincent was found stumbling down the road, nude, holding $\,$ up her arms so that the muscles and blood would not fall out,"
- ▶ Singleton sentenced to 14 years but only served 8 for "good behavior"
- ▶ After being released he murdered another woman.
- Singleton became a national symbol of the shortfalls within the criminal justice system. If laws had been less lenient then Lawrence Singleton would never have been released and Roxanne Hayes would still be alive.

 Policy on prison sentences changed from this case



































































Issues in the 21st Century

- ▶ The study of sexual predators by analyzing crime scenes was based on the premise that facets of a criminal's personality are evident in his offense.
- ▶ Like a fingerprint, the crime scene can be used to aid in identifying the murderer.
- ► The findings were published in scientific journals as well as the crime book, "Mindhunter" named after the profiling unit at the FBI Academy.

#Me Too cases

- remarkably similar accounts of multiple women, who said that Bill Cosby gave them pills that rendered them unconscious or semi-conscious and then penetrated them, disclose Cosby's signature method, which showed his Intent to penetrate Constand without consent in that instance—as distinct from a mere propensity to commit sexual assault.

Brock Turner

- ▶ on January 18, 2015, when he sexually penetrated an intoxicated and unconscious 22-year-old woman (later called "Emily Doe") with his fingers
- ▶ Turner was apprehended by two Stanford international students from Sweden, who testified that they intervened because the woman appeared to be unconscious



Victim Statement

- ➤ The victim impact statement to the court was also widely disseminated by international media outlets, fueling a resurgence of the wider debate regarding the epidemic of campus sexual assault overall.
- Her statement described her suffering in vivid detail, dissecting and criticizing Turner's actions both during and after the assault, and criticizing the probation department's recommendation of a short sentence for Turner.



Mattress Girl

▶ During her senior year at Columbia University, Emma Sulkowicz carried a 50-pound mattress around wherever she went, a performance-art project, "Carry That Weight," representing that the man who Sulkowicz said raped her walked free on campus.



Rape 1970 - 2020: A Review

- $\,\blacktriangleright\,$ Rape, until the 1970s, thrived on prudery, misunderstanding, and silence.
- ▶ It was not until the 1980s that academic and scientific publications on the subject multiplied.
- But despite increased attention to the public health issue, statistics haven't budged much.
- Between 25-30% of females and 10% of males will be sexually assaulted over their life span and more than half will never report the crime to law enforcement.
- Rape does not discriminate by age. Victims can be as young as toddlers and as old as seniors in nursing homes.
