- How You Can Show It: Submit official transcripts that highlight academic achievements. Maintain a competitive GPA and complete prerequisite courses.

2. Accountability

- What We Look For: A track record of responsibility and reliability in academics and beyond.
- Why It's Important: Nurses must be accountable for their actions and patient care decisions.
- How You Can Show It: Demonstrate consistency in academic performance and work experiences requiring responsibility.
